New Senate VAWA Bill Would Leave Native Women Less Protected and Undermine Tribal Sovereignty

WASHINGTON, DC – On Nov 20, 2019, Senator Joni Ernst (R-IA) introduced new Republican Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) legislation that would leave Native women less protected from violent offenders by destabilizing tribal courts and infringing on tribal sovereignty. After the failure of bipartisan negotiations, Senator Ernst took the lead to introduce this highly problematic language despite hearing concerns during several meetings with Native women, tribal leaders, and tribal organizations.

This legislation, if enacted, would destabilize tribal justice systems by imposing undue burdens and restrictions on tribal courts far beyond those imposed on federal and state courts, including audits by the Attorney General and leaves Tribes vulnerable to lawsuits by defendants of tribal courts through the stripping of sovereign immunity.

Ultimately, this bill would eliminate the gains made in VAWA 2013 and infringes on the inherent tribal authority of tribal nations to prosecute crimes committed against their citizens on tribal lands

Although partisanship has unfortunately introduced itself into VAWA discussions among certain key Senate voices, there is clear hope that partisanship will not prevail among those who seek to protect women and children throughout Indian country and rural America, where the majority of tribal courts preside and provide protections to Indians and non-Indians alike.

Senator Ernst's bill puts a partisan spin on a non-partisan issue. Senator Ernst's bill includes the expanded jurisdiction over covered crimes, yet strips tribal court authority at the same time, while providing for increased authorization amounts for grants to Tribes, and several marker bills in an attempt to garner tribal support. Safety for Native women is not a partisan issue, and nothing can serve as a bargaining chip for the safety of Native women and the restoration of tribal sovereignty.

In contrast to the legislation Senator Ernst has introduced, the House version of VAWA, H.R. 1585, passed with significant bi-partisan support and Senate Bill 2843, introduced on November 13, 2019, includes the tribal provisions that national, regional, and local tribal organizations have worked hard for.

There is no reason to substitute the language in H.R. 1585 and S. 2843 with language that will preclude tribal courts, and ultimately tribal nations, from protecting their most vulnerable populations, Native women and children. We cannot go backward and introduce VAWA provisions that destabilize and limit the inherent authority of tribal nations.

"Despite the fact that the implementation of VAWA 2013 has been a success – both for the protection of victims in our communities as well as the due process rights of non-Indian defendants – Ernst's bill is based on the assumption that the protections for Native victims in VAWA 2013 must be rolled back because tribal courts are not capable of fairly administering justice," said Mary Kathryn Nagle, Partner, Counsel, National Indigenous Women's Resource Center (NIWRC).

"Since 2013, tribes have clearly demonstrated this assumption to be false. Tribal courts prosecuting non-Indian defendants already provide the same – if not more – due process rights than state and federal courts. Placing paternalistic restrictions on tribal courts in the name of 'due process' is nothing more than a disguise for prejudice. Legislation that strips tribal courts of their inherent authority to protect victims in their communities based on prejudice alone must be stopped."


"NIWRC looks forward to engaging in continued dialogue with Senate Republicans and Democrats regarding the need to protect Native women. The Ernst bill was unfortunately drafted in a process that excluded the voices of our tribal leaders and our Native women survivors." said

MUCKLESHOOT TEAMS UP WITH SEATTLE SEAHAWKS!

The Seattle Seahawks and the Muckleshoot Tribe recently announced a new 10-year partnership. In honor of this new partnership, the tribe hosted Seahawks executives, along with legend Walter Jones, Thomas Rawls and team mascot Blitz, for a special celebration event at the Muckleshoot Tribal Offices in Auburn on November 1, 2019.

The event included cultural performances by tribal members, a ceremonial blanket wrapping with Tribal Elder Royalty and meeting with the Tribal Council. After meeting with the council, the Seahawks delegation mixed generously with a large crowd that had gathered in front of the Philip Starr Building. Many pictures were taken and autographs signed. Hall of Famer Walter Jones also spoke to students at the Muckleshoot Tribal School about the impor-



Transaction lauded as a positive development for both tribes

SNOQUALMIE, WA – The Muckleshoot and Snoqualmie Indian Tribes announced an historic agreement to transfer ownership of the Salish Lodge & Spa, as well as the land surrounding Snoqualmie Falls, to the Snoqualmie Indian Tribe. The total purchase encompasses approximately 45 acres of land in the Snoqualmie Tribe's traditional territory. The purchase price was \$125 million.

The Muckleshoot Tribe acquired the Lodge in 2007 to build and diversify the tribe's economy. Since that acquisition the Muckleshoot Tribe has invested to preserve and enhance the property and maintain its status as one of the top-ranked resorts in the country.

The purchase includes the property north of and across State Route 202, as well as the Salish Lodge & Spa, and the Snoqualmie Falls Gift Shop. The Snoqualmie Tribe said it will continue to operate the Lodge with current management company Columbia Hospitality, Inc., and customers of the Lodge will experience the same high-quality experience they have come to expect. A planned develop-



tance of education and hard work.

The partnership also includes entitlement of CenturyLink Field's North Plaza to be named Muckleshoot Plaza. Fans will see elements of the partnership at stadium events throughout the year, including artwork to showcase the rich history of the Tribe, as well as on Seahawks gamedays through annual tribal dance performances.

"We are thrilled to welcome the Muckleshoot Tribe to the Seahawks family," said Amy Sprangers, Seahawks Senior Vice President of Revenue. "We are excited about what we plan to accomplish together to inspire and enrich our collective communities for years to come."

ment approved by the City of Snoqualmie last October will no longer advance, Snoqualmie Tribal officials said.

The agreement comes after discussions and negotiations between the two sovereign tribal governments and represents a unique situation in which the Muckleshoot Tribe has supported the restoration of sacred and culturally significant land to the Snoqualmie people.

Snoqualmie Falls and the surrounding area is the most important sacred site to the

Snoqualmie Tribe and is central to the history, spiritual practice, and identity of the Snoqualmie people. Its preservation is of the highest importance to the Snoqualmie Tribe.

"This purchase represents the Snoqualmie Tribe's ongoing work to reclaim its traditional lands and will allow the Snoqualmie people to appropriately care for our sacred Falls and share it with all who wish to experience the powerful connection," said Snoqualmie Tribal Chairman, Robert de los Ange-

les. "We are incredibly grateful to the Muckleshoot Tribe for their willingness to partner in our goal of protecting and preserving this sacred area."

Muckleshoot Tribal Chairman, Jaison Elkins added: "It is a great feeling when Tribes can come together to further enhance both of their organizations. Salish Lodge is a premier resort in the Pacific Northwest. Knowing that its ownership will remain local with our neighbor Tribe is a positive for the

CHAIRMAN'S ORNER

Vice-Chair Donny Stevenson here... Muckleshoot has been clearly recognized making major waves and dominating the major media market over the 72 hours that made up the weekend of Friday, November 1st, Saturday, November 2nd, and Sunday, November 3rd, 2019... over this period, one literally could not turn on the television, listen to the radio, open or access any social media platform or even the rare case of unfolding a newspaper (yes, old school I know... shout-out Muckleshoot Messenger!!!) without reading the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe's name.

As I reflect I find myself hopeful that these same waves ripple across and throughout time... from our current place and state, out into the future of our children and grandchildren... throughout time immemorial.

The Seattle Seahawks partnership (which as a result of all-year stadium access, also extends to the MLS Champion, Seattle Sounders, as well as any and all concert traffic held in the locale), the \$125-million sale of the Salish Lodge to the Snoqualmie Tribe for an incredibly strong financial profit and – just-as-importantly – for the sound moral principle of aiding our relation Tribe, Snoqualmie, in regaining access and ownership of lands and grounds they consider sacred to their people.

I truly believe it must be noted, Muckleshoot made the very direct and intentional decision to bypass placing this land and property on the open commercial real estate market, and instead proactively approached the Snoqualmie Tribe to provide them first right of refusal to purchase this property which borders the Falls. This decision was rooted in Muckleshoot's recognition of the status Snoqualmie assigns the site; the sacred place internally-recognized as their place of creation and origin.

Finally, an exclusive Tribal collaboration with NHL-Seattle (which, based on the new arena, once completed, will also include three-time WNBA Champions, the Seattle Storm, and any potential future NBA franchise which may return to Seattle) Some weekends it is amazing to stop... take a step back... and take an honest inventory of the work that has played out in service of Muckleshoot. I know this is one particular weekend as I sat back and reflected on - one that I was left feeling incredibly proud of our Tribe's accomplishments, including our overall current approach and the ultimate state and place of our people and affairs as a result!!!

Please understand it goes without saying, that we still have so much work to do and so many areas remain to continue to work on, improve and address. It is also with the upmost humility and appreciation that I call for healthy celebration and deserved recognition of the successes of late that this single weekend seemed to represent. region and all Indian Country. This sale is a prime example of Indian Self Determination and how Tribal nations can conduct business in a culturally sensitive way. The Muckleshoot Tribe plans to focus on new facilities and services for our tribal members and customers."

The transaction was finalized on Thursday, October 31st, with the Snoqualmie Tribe becoming the legal owner of Salish Lodge and the surrounding land. The Snoqualmie Tribe is celebrating this historic achievement in conjunction with its 20th anniversary of federal recognition which occurred on October 6th, 1999 after decades of petitioning.

Due to the Snoqualmie Tribe's success in its first 20 years since then, it has been able to diversify economically in a way that upholds Tribal values. It secures for all time its most sacred and beloved site and returns the falls to the ownership and stewardship of the Snoqualmie people.

Columbia Hospitality will continue to operate the Lodge, providing the same great level of service guests have come to expect and appreciate.

"Salish Lodge is one of the most iconic and beloved destinations the Northwest, and we are honored to continue building on its legacy with the Snoqualmie Indian Tribe," said John Oppenheimer, CEO and founder of Columbia Hospitality, Inc., which has managed Salish Lodge since 2007.

"The thoughtful and impassioned service that our team members provide day-in and day-out will continue to be a pillar of the Salish experience, and we look forward to partnering with the Snoqualmie Tribe to find even more ways to connect our guests to the surrounding area and heritage."

"Snoqualmie Falls is a sacred place and a globally beloved landmark, and the Salish Lodge is an iconic Northwest institution," said Chairman de los Angeles. NIWRC Board Member Deborah Parker. "This process has resulted in a bill, that in its current form, would constitute a significant rollback of the protections that VAWA 2013 provided to Native women. We cannot afford to step back. We can only move forward."

"We are deeply disappointed by the VAWA legislation introduced by Senator Ernst," said Chairwoman Teri Gobin, Tulalip Tribes. "The bill erodes tribal sovereignty and attacks the independence of our tribal judicial systems, and would prevent us from protecting our woman and children from perpetrators. And certainly, we will not allow non-VAWA specific legislation be used as a bargaining chip when it comes to protecting our women and children. The public safety of our communities is of the utmost importance for all citizens, and we urge all Senators to support S.2843, the Senate companion to the bi-partisan bill passed by the House last April."

"Tribal issues are nonpartisan issues. As a Native woman and a survivor, I call on the Senate to stand with Native women and survivors and not allowing partisan politics to get in the way of protecting the safety of Native women and the sovereignty of tribal nations," said Cherrah Giles, Chairwoman, National Indigenous Women's Resource Center. "NIWRC remains committed to working with senators on both sides of the aisle to enhance safety for Native women."

NIWRC remains hopeful that the Senate will be able to pass a bipartisan reauthorization of VAWA that protects tribal sovereignty, instead of diminishing it, and thereby increasing safety for Native women and children.




I would like to say a few things about Stan Jones' funeral! His funeral was great! It was so crowded! Even in the Casino! They had to put some people across the hallway, but there was still speakers in there! So many Chairmen of other tribes were there – Mel Tonasket, Pearl Capoeman-Baller and Brian Cladoosby! They all had something to offer to him!

You really missed out if you were unable to make it to his funeral! At the end, one of his daughters got up to thank everyone for coming, but she wanted to add some of what he was saying before he died. You know, he was born during the poorest times – no water in the

house, no toilet in the house... we didn't have anything and he was thinking of back then, and he was concerned that the kids had nothing to eat, and had no shoes!

He asked his daughter if the kids had food. She told him yes, they had food. He asked her if they had shoes. She said yes, they had shoes. Then he would ask about the budget of the tribe, and she said, "Yes, we now have money," and then she would tell him about their budget, and said, "Really?!?"

To me, this was really a learning for anyone that was there! His concern was for the Children of the Community at his last time he was able to talk! This would have been the best Teachings that anyone on the Council could have asked for... I'm sorry that none of our Council Members were able to make it up to Tulalip for this funeral. It still brings tears to my eyes to think of all that was said! God Bless his family and his Community! Thank you!

Rosalie Fish speaks at **Seattle TEDx event**

Rosalie Fish presented an extremely moving and personal talk about the importance of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women (MMIW) on October 27 at TEDx Youth Seattle.

Fish, now a student and athlete at Iowa Central Community College, described her past struggles with depression and the bullying she experienced as a result of wearing Native clothing before transferring to Muckleshoot Tribal School.

She then presented a heart-wrenching description of the problem of MMIW. Fish explained that she was inspired to run for MMIW by watching Lakota marathon runner Jordan Marie Brings Three White Horses Daniel run for MMIW.

At the Washington State 1B Track Meet in Spokane, Fish dedicated each of her races to a specific indigenous woman who was missing or had been murdered, including her own aunt, who disappeared in 2004 and was later found dead, and Muckleshoot tribal member Renee Davis, who

was killed by police on the Muckleshoot Reservation in 2016.

Fish described how much it meant to her to dedicate her medals to these women and their families. Her talk brought much needed attention to the plight of MMIW and to the difficulties of growing up in the face of discrimination.








As I reflect on Tomanamus Community Day and the Seahawks Partnership Signing event, I am reminded of the progress we have made and continue to make as a community. Our ability to change with the time and the resiliency of our people is our living legacy and the greatest gift we can offer to the next generation.

That said, being surrounded by a multigenerational crowd at both of these recent events up at was a testament of the Muckleshoot Tribe's opportunity to shift from a time of just surviving to a time of thriving.

More than ever, I am committed to taking actions through my work as the School Commission Chair to secure a bright future for all Muckleshoot members through obtaining quality education offered in classrooms that are places of healing and empowerment. These actions include the adoption and implementation of the Muckleshoot Tribal Education Truancy Ordinance. The purpose of the ordinance is to ensure students have the most positive learning experience and opportunities for success.

Historically, the boarding school era instilled in us the belief that keeping our children home and out of school meant we kept them safer and in considering the ugliness of that era, that belief was right. We must never forget how education can harm and traumatize, and we must also take the opportunity to move forward and advocate for our children to receive the best quality education so that the world can be accessible to them. That is the tough work of constructing and relentlessly advocating for learning environments that are safe and healthy for our students where they can have positive learning experiences.

That being said, attendance matters. Studies show that missing just one day of school is equivelent to missing three to five days of school as each day of learning builds on the previous day. Students get behind and have to catch up on their own. Not only does this put more stress on the







Does That Device Belong on My Network? (Part 2)

Last time we talked about general Wi-Fi security processes and we promised to cover some more detailed wireless security measures this time. What we are going to talk about here, also has the added advantage of providing you parents out there a way to police the kids Wi-Fi usage without inconveniencing everyone else.

Most wireless routers have what is called a 'White List' which is just a fancy way of saying these are the device we allow on the network. By going into the settings and specifically allowing only certain devices you are making it so that other or 'rogue' devices aren't able to connect to the network. To do this you go into the allowed devices list and you add the MAC address (it is a special device serial number that all internet connected devices have, use google to learn how to look it up for specific devices). That's it by using the allowed devices function you are blocking every device that you don't add to the list.

Now for the parental controls; some of those lists allow you to set timers so that devices are only allowed for certain times of day, or you could always just tell them you'll re-add their device when their chores are done.

Check back next addition as






IN CLASS HELP





\$45,000 Housing Assistance Program - Increased to \$90,000 per Tribal Member

The Tribe's commitment to providing housing opportunities to its members is once again exemplified with recent policy changes to the \$45,000 Grant Program. Tribal Council recently approved that the \$45,000 Grant Program be increased to \$90,000 per Tribal member. These funds can be used for home ownership activities including down payment, mortgage reduction, home improvements, self-help and safe housing repairs. In addition, the Tribal Housing Ordinance has been updated to allow Muckleshoot enrolled couples to each utilize their \$90,000 grant towards eligible program services for a total Grant of \$180,000. \$20,000 of each member's assistance shall be reserved exclusively for safe housing repairs.

ELIGIBILIT

Muckleshoot Tribal Enrollment: Applicant must be a Muckleshoot Tribal member at least eighteen (18) years of age and enrolled in the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe for a minimum of five (5) years or be enrolled in the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe and have resided within the Muckleshoot Reservation their entire

Proof of Ownership: Applicants must provide proof of ownership for the assisted property and utilize the home as their primary residence

Proof of Insurance: Applicants must provide proof that the assisted property is covered by an insurance policy or sign a Homeowners Insurance Acknowledgment.

Release of Information: Applicants must sign a Release of Information to allow the Muckleshoot Housing Authority to obtain and verify information relative to eligibility for assistance.

Residency/Payback Agreement: Applicants, including any additional parties with ownership of the assisted property, must sign a Residency Payback Agreement agreeing to payback terms and refinance restrictions during a five


In short, the start of the positive learning experience begins with good attendance, derived from the Truancy Ordinance is the Truancy Board. The purpose of the Truancy Board is to ensure regular attendance for all school-age children enrolled at the Muckleshoot Tribal School and to take culturally preventative steps to prevent students from facing the tribal legal system. Five community members oversee this process. The Board members are fully supported by Tribal Education Leadership, the Tribal School Truancy Team and the School Commission members.

Led by Cathy Calvert, the Assistant Tribal Education Officer, the Truancy Board held its first training on November 14, 2019. The Board members were guided through MTS Attendance Policy, the role of Tribal School Commission, the role of Tribal Court, the role of data and reviewed a case study to put policies and procedures into perspective.

The start of this ordinance imprints another visionary initiative by our tribe to ensure Muckleshoot is the guiding force in tribal education.
