2023 Canoe Journey theme is selected: "Honoring Our Warriors, Past and Present"

The Muckleshoot Tribe has committed to hosting the Annual Canoe Journey in 2023. Originally, we were to host this year, but the whole calendar was moved forward a year by mutual agreement of participating Tribes and First Nations in response to the pandemic.

As Coast Salish people, our efforts to revive the canoe culture is now in its 20th year of this traditional and cultural practice. For those old enough to remember – and many of our youth weren't even born then – the last time Muckleshoot hosted was 16 summers ago in 2006.

Entitled "Past & Present, Pulling Together for Our Future," the hosting was probably the largest event the tribe had ever undertaken. Muckleshoot leaders and elders greeted 70 canoes at Magnuson Park on a Monday and hosted them in the biggest tent ever erected on the reservation for the rest of the week.

The Seattle Times described it as follows: "Monday captured the true spirit of Seattle: On the shimmering waters of Lake Washington dozens of Northwest Native American canoes paddled to Sand Point at Magnuson Park. This year's host, the Muckleshoot Tribe, enriched us all by incorporating the canoe experience into our urban environment."

We are starting work now on next year's hosting and are pleased to announce that our theme will be "Honoring Our Warriors, Past and Present" in recognition of our proud history.

Not only are we looking to having our youth get involved, we want the whole family to be involved. Each one of you would have a place and value in making this event meaningful. You would be doing it for your children, the tribe, and for our ancestors. We need to be respectful to maintain their ways of life and how it brought us to where we are today.

You all can help some way to make this hosting successful by helping and volunteering or assist in the giveaway making effort. We need to make sure we honor our visitors and send them home with good thoughts and prayers. It takes a community to host a Canoe Hosting event and we will need your help.

Once you see how our families from Canada, Washington, Oregon and many other places share their culture, you will be inspired by their commitments to make us happy and to give us a good experience of their ways, culture and traditions. Help us help them so that we can feel good about how we treated our honored guests and how they respected us by answering our invitation and sharing.



CHAIRMAN'S LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Muckleshoot Maintains Strong Presence in Washington, DC and Olympia

The Tribal Council is proud to bring Muckleshoot's voice to Washington, DC, but



through our advocacy we also try to raise up the voices of all Native peoples. President Biden recently signed into law the \$1.5 trillion Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2022 (FY22 Budget) and, thanks to the Tribe's advocacy, there are many programs that will make a direct impact in our community here, but also help Indian Country as a whole.

I am especially proud of the strategic funding wins that will help strengthen our treaty rights by protecting the ecosystem and cleaning up Puget Sound.

The FY22 Budget sets the Bureau of Indian Affairs budget at \$2.2 (an increase of \$104 million from the FY21 Budget) and the Indian Health Service budget at \$6.6 billion (an increase of \$394.7 million from the FY21 Budget).

Education funding for the Bureau of Indian Education was set at \$1.28 billion (an increase of \$44.6 million from the FY21 Budget), which will directly impact Muckleshoot students and provide our school system with more resources to meet the needs our kids.

The FY22 Budget also included \$31.9 million for Tribal Climate Resilience (a \$15 million increase from the FY21 Budget), \$60.2 million for Indian Forestry Programs (a \$5.6 million increase from the FY21 Budget), \$6 million for Tribal Wildlife Grants, and \$34.2 million for Puget Sound cleanup efforts.

These increases are in part due to the steadfast advocacy of the Tribal Council and our engagement in Washington, DC. It is essential that we bring the voice of our people to our federal partners so they can understand the true needs that the United States' commitment to the trust responsibility demands.

The testimony was submitted as Congress



begins its work on the FY23 Budget and it ensures that Congress hears the Tribe's voice and priorities as the new budget is crafted. We are committed to maintaining a strong presence in Washington, DC for the good of not only our tribe, but for all of Indian Country.

STATE LEGISLATIVE REVIEW

The 2022 legislative session concluded on March 10 following a whirlwind 60 consecutive days of action. Attention now turns to the coming mid-term elections, with all seats in the State House up for election, and roughly half the seats in the Senate up.

Numerous incumbents have already announced their retirements, and next year's Legislature promises to look very different from what we've seen in recent years. Below are a few highlights of state action from 2022 and how they will be impactful moving forward:

Protecting Tribal Gaming – Legislation was introduced in both the House and Senate to expand sports wagering to non-tribal cardrooms. MIT led the opposition to such efforts and worked with House and Senate leadership

Interior Secretary Haaland seeks to change 100's of derogatory place names

WASHINGTON, DC – "Our nation's lands and waters should be places to celebrate the outdoors and our shared cultural heritage – not to perpetuate the legacies of oppression," Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland said as she ordered the word "squaw" to be removed from federal place names.

Through Secretarial Order 3404, Haaland formally declared "squaw" to be a derogatory term and ordered a task force to find replacement names for valleys, lakes, creeks and other sites on federal lands that use the word. The official order, which took effect immediately upon signing, stands to affect more than 650 place names that use the term, according to figures from the U.S. Board on Geographic Names.

"The term has historically been used as an offensive ethnic, racial, and sexist slur, particularly for Indigenous women," the Interior Department said.

One of the most prominent places using the name, the historic Squaw Valley Ski Resort at Lake Tahoe, was one of the first to respond, changing its name to Palisades Tahoe Ski Resort.

The origin of the word "squaw" has been

traced to the Eastern dialects of the Algonquian language, in which it simply meant "woman." But its meaning, originally used

correctly by colonists in the 1600s to refer to local Algonquin women, later evolved into a derogatory slur as colonial expansion continued westward. By the mid-1800's, it was clearly a disparaging term in all usages, but the term continued to be used in place names and by prejudiced individuals to the present day.

Secretarial Order 3404 creates a Derogatory Geographic Names Task Force that will be required to engage in Tribal consultation on proposed name changes. This will be done through an Advisory Committee on Reconciliation in Place Names that will include representation from Indian Tribes, Tribal and Native Hawaiian organizations, civil rights, anthropology, and history experts, and members of the general public.

Several states have previously passed legislation prohibiting the use of the word "squaw" in place names, including Montana, Oregon, Maine and Minnesota. There is also legislation pending in both chambers of Congress to address derogatory names on geographic features on public land units.

CHAIRMAN'S CORNER

Dear Fellow Muckleshoot Tribal Members,
I hope this message finds you, your families, and our entire community well. I know that the end of the month is upon us, but in honor of Women's History Month I am going to focus this space on the work the Muckleshoot Tribe has been doing to promote Native women's issues.

Let me begin by discussing the crucial work we've been doing to help address the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Peoples (MMIP) epidemic. You may notice that the term has been altered from MMIW to MMIP, because Native men go missing as do women.

With regard to women, the Urban Indian Health Institute found that Native women in Washington State go missing at a rate more than four times higher than the state's white residents and that our state had the second highest number of missing and murdered Indigenous women cases among the 29 states surveyed.

In the last session of Congress, the Tribe advocated for successful passage of two landmark bills to help address the MMIP pandemic; the Not Invisible Act and Savanna's Act. The Not Invisible Act increases coordination of efforts to reduce violent crime within Indian lands and against Indians, while Savanna's Act directs the Justice Department to review, revise and develop law enforcement and justice protocols to address the MMIP epidemic. Both laws are currently being implemented.

This Congress, the Tribe advocated for the Senate confirmation of the Honorable Deb Haaland (Pueblo of Laguna) to serve as the Secretary of the Interior. In March 2021, Haaland was sworn in as Interior Secretary, becoming the first Native American ever to serve in the President's Cabinet.

Since taking office, Secretary Haaland has made Indian Country a top priority. She has worked tirelessly to protect sacred sites, address the MMIP epidemic, tackle climate change, improve public safety and justice, and establish the Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative and the Missing and Murdered Unit.

Finally, the Tribe has been advocating for the reauthorization of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) for several years. We are pleased to report that VAWA was incorporated into the recently enacted Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2022 and passed into law. It contains several crucial tribal provisions, including the restoration of tribal jurisdiction over crimes of child violence, sexual violence, sex trafficking, stalking, obstruction of justice, and assault of tribal justice personnel committed by non-Indian offenders.

I'll close by reiterating the words of Secretary Haaland, who said "Take time this month to thank the fierce women in your life who make the world a better place." Let us reflect upon this month as a time to celebrate all our fierce Muckleshoot women – past, present, and future. We surely would not be where we are today without them. I wish you all good health, peace, and warm wishes.

Learn the Real Duwamish History

The website listed above takes an important look at our culture and heritage tied to our Duwamish ancestors. Please take a look.

For those that may support Federal Recognition of the Duwamish Organization, I invite you to see the issue through a different lens: Muckleshoot as the legal successors of the Duwamish.

Our tribe wasn't originally called Muckleshoot. That is a place name given to the area where our reservation is located. We are descendants of Duwamish ancestors that came to this reservation. There were other bands of Natives that came here too, about seven I believe.

In addition, there are Duwamish descendants at other federally recognized tribes in the area as well: Tulalip, Suquamish, etc. They had several reservations to choose from.

The Seattle-based organization would allow you to believe Duwamish didn't get a reservation and deserve recognition but that argument is a flat out lie! Suquamish and Muckleshoot reservations were specifically designated for Duwamish people.

The organization applying for Federal recognition is a voluntary association, which is much different from a political, legal, and governmental entity. For example, you couldn't get a group of French descendants together and then start calling them France! Or maybe the Sons of Norway might begin to assert they are a government and not just a culture club.

This is a complex and nuanced issue worthy of deep consideration and not just blind support to check a box that says "I support Native issues."

Furthermore this is about the integrity and protection of tribal sovereignty and treaties not to mention Cultural appropriation/identity theft. The Duwamish organization is hijacking Muckleshoot heritage and using it to coax people out of \$ (Real Rent) and to perpetuate their false and highly flawed narrative. It's an outrage and an attack of our Muckleshoot tribal heritage, history, and people.

Finally, the implications of this issue go far beyond Muckleshoot and our generation. We need to protect our tribal sovereignty for the generations ahead. #realduwamish

on both sides of the political aisle to ensure the bill was not advanced. Neither bill received a public hearing.

We anticipate additional proposals in coming years, whether at the Legislature or via an initiative, to expand gambling and threaten tribal government revenue streams. MIT will continue leading the opposition and working to protect tribal gaming interests to ensure self-sufficiency and economic opportunity for our citizens.

Educating the Public on Tribal Sovereignty and Treaty Rights – MIT has led the effort in recent years to educate state and local elected officials, as well as the general public, on the importance of respecting tribal sovereignty. Many non-tribal leaders do not fully appreciate the unique status of federally recognized tribes as sovereign governmental entities.

Through our public awareness campaigns, as well as one-on-one sessions with elected officials, MIT has worked to inform and educate non-tribal leaders on the importance and significance of respecting sovereignty upholding treaty rights. This helps ensure proper collaboration and treatment of tribal governments when developing state and local policies that impact tribal interests.

Strengthening Tribal-State Consultation – One of the primary ways to ensure proper respect for tribal sovereignty and treaty rights is through government-to-government consultation between the Tribe and state and local governmental entities. This year, MIT helped lead the effort to pass legislation codifying a new tribal-state consultation framework for clean energy projects funded by the Climate Commitment Act (the carbon cap & invest law from 2021).

Similarly, MIT successfully advocated for the passage of new legislation to develop tribal consultation for public school districts and to train

Broadband funding expanded to tribal libraries

A new change in unpalatable rules by the federal bureaucracy may mean the Federal Communications Commission may now make it more affordable and fund more broadband internet to be installed in more communities in Indian Country.

Broadband is a complicated necessity. When someone gets funding or new access to connect to the old "world-wide web" it lays the path

for more people to get the internet in their homes. For the longest time, Native Americans – with 628,000 tribal residences lacking access to basic broadband, a rate more than four times that of the general population – have been limited in services such as telemedicine, distance learning, legal information, government subsidies and more.

It was the Covid pandemic, strangely enough, that brought the Native American digital divide back into the limelight that allowed this to finally change. On Jan. 27, the FCC voted unanimously to make tribal libraries fully eligible for participation in its E-Rate Program, which provides libraries and schools discounts of up to 90 percent for broadband services. The federal program deploys \$3.9 billion a year to eligible institutions, which, until now, has excluded tribal libraries.

The expanded access to broadband at tribal libraries could serve as one piece of the puzzle to alleviate the digital divide in Indian Country. The Muckleshoot Tribe already receives this service through its partnership with King County's Library System, so we won't be as directly involved as other tribes in Washington, but our state is far behind others in the number of its Native Americans having internet access.

This funding could have a significant effect on people you know throughout the state who have no digital access. Watch for changes here soon (soon for bureaucracy, that is).

Stay Muckleshoot Proud and hope for more digital access for all of Indian Country!

these districts on how best to work with their local federally recognized tribes to ensure Native students are best served and that all students receive proper instruction on tribal history, culture, and government.

Addressing Missing & Murdered Indigenous Persons (MMIP) – MIT has long been a leader on the MMIP crisis. Over the past year, MIT has helped develop a Task Force with the State Attorney General's Office to address many of the ongoing challenges on this issue. This past session, MIT supported the successful passage of two bills dealing with MMIP: one to create a statewide alert system similar to Amber Alerts for missing indigenous persons, and another to ensure better notice and inter-agency collaboration, and to provide grant funding for additional services to survivors. MIT will continue to serve on the Attorney General's Task Force and will continue to help lead on this critical issue.

Supporting Salmon Recovery Efforts – This year, Washington State finally set a course to fully fund its court-ordered obligation to remove fish passage barriers (culverts) by allocating \$2.6 billion to address the ongoing issue. Coupled with the state's additional investment of approximately \$180 million for various salmon production, habitat management, and grant programs across the state, this marks the largest single investment from the state in salmon recovery to date. MIT will continue to work to ensure the state is fulfilling its obligations to promote and support salmon recovery and responsible habitat management for our future generations.

As I conclude, I want to assure you that the entire Tribal Council takes its responsibilities to fight for our people and our sovereignty very seriously at the local, state and federal level. We will continue to remain engaged in both Olympia and Washington, D.C. to make sure our voices are heard. Muckleshoot has become a force to be reckoned with.

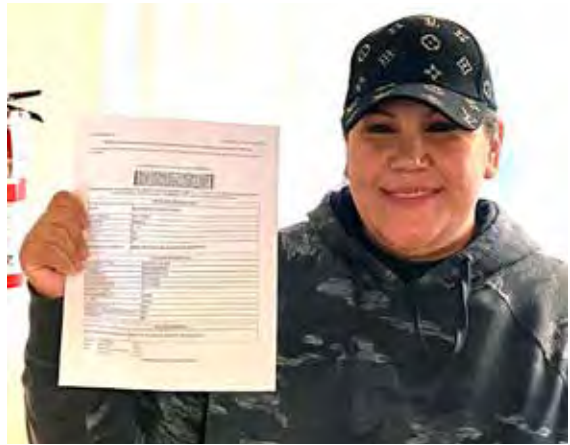

Interior Department Takes Steps to Increase Voter Registration in Indigenous Communities

WASHINGTON – The Department of the Interior recently released the White House's Native American Voting Rights Report, which chronicles the barriers Native voters face and recommends actions for policy-makers at every level to help break these barriers down.

This report outlines steps to implement President Biden's Executive Order on Promoting Access to Voting, which aims to expand access to, and education about, voter registration and election information in order to enable all eligible Americans to participate in our democracy.

"Tribal nations have played a significant role in influencing the contours of American democracy, yet systemic barriers continue to disenfranchise Indigenous people and impede a free and fair electoral process," said Secretary Deb Haaland.

"The Interior Department is committed to defending the right to vote, which includes increasing access to voter registration and engaging young people in our democratic system."

In March 2021, President Biden directed the creation of an Interagency Steering Group on Native



American Voting Rights to study the barriers Native voters face in casting their ballot and to recommend steps to mitigate or eliminate these barriers.

The Steering Group held six consultations with Tribal leaders and Native American voting rights advocates across the country, and engaged in listen-

ing sessions with Native Hawaiians, organizations advocating for improved Tribal voting rights, and state and local election officials in jurisdictions with sizable Native populations.

These sessions sought ways to mitigate barriers to voting for Native communities and revealed recurring and unnecessary impediments to the franchise.

To ensure that the White House report is accessible to a wide audience across Indian Country, the Assistant Secretary's office is spearheading an effort to translate the report into six Native languages that reflect the regional consultation structure: Navajo, Yup'ik, Ojibwe, Cherokee, Lakota and Native Hawaiian.

Vashon Clam Digging Open & Oyster Permits Available

The Muckleshoot Fisheries Division is pleased to announce that the Tribe's Vashon Island tidelands are OPEN for Clam Digging and Oyster Harvest Permits are now available at the Fisheries Office.

To harvest oysters, Tribal members – 18 years or older – must first obtain an Oyster Harvest Permit from the Fisheries Office in the Philip Starr Building. Each permit allows the subsistence harvest of 60 oysters on three separate occasions – no commercial harvest is allowed. After using the Oyster Permit for three days of harvest, the permit holder must return it to the Fisheries office for another permit to be issued – **so please make sure to return all old Oyster Permits even if you didn't harvest any oysters.** This allows MIT Fisheries to monitor and keep an up-to-date inventory of the oyster resource at the tidelands.

Fisheries staff routinely collect the clams and oysters at the tidelands and subsequent analysis by the Washington State Department of Health has shown that the level of the toxin that causes paralytic shellfish poisoning – also known as red tide – is not present. Harvest of all bivalve species at the tidelands is allowed. Check the Fisheries hotline (**1-800-FISH-NOW option 3**) to get the latest update.

For individuals who cannot walk the 1/4-mile trail down to the Tribe's beach, special oyster requests from Tribal Elders and disabled Tribal members can be made at the Fisheries office or by telephone **253-876-3335**.

The natural populations of butter clams, little-neck steamers, cockles, and horse clams at the tidelands are in good condition, see the accompanying harvest information or contact Andy Dalton (253-486-3926) about harvesting opportunities. Please remember to always check the hotline (**1-800-FISH-NOW, option 3**) in the morning before going clam digging.

Things You Should Know About Clam Digging

- 1** Beware: You can get sick from clams harvested at Adelaide Beach, Alki Beach, Redondo, Lincoln Park, Salt Water State Park and all other beaches between Seattle and Tacoma. They are all potentially polluted and are closed by the Department of Health.
- 2** Tribal members can dig clams at the Tribe's property on Vashon Island. There are lots of butter clams and some steamers, horse clams and cockles at the beach. Driving directions are provided at the end of this list.
- 3** Fisheries staff will be routinely testing the clams at the Vashon beach for "red tide" to insure the clams are safe to eat. Always check on the Fish Hotline (1-800-FISH-NOW) and press option three (3) for Shellfish for results to see if the Vashon tidelands are open.
- 4** Use a small clam shovel (not a fork or garden shovel). The Vashon tidelands are rocky and digging clams is more difficult than at sandy beaches. A clam shovel works best.
- 5** If you want to go to the property by personal boat, the Fisheries Division will provide you with a chart to locate the tidelands and a good place to anchor or beach your boat.
- 6** For driving directions on Navigation Apps use: 13060 Vashon Highway SW, Vashon Island, WA.
- 7** The driveway at the property has a locked gate so call the Fisheries Division: 253-486-3926 to get the combination to the locked gate and updated red tide results.
- 8** Check the ferry schedule that is printed here with the tide charts. There is a fee for the ferry from either West Seattle (Fauntleroy) or Pt Defiance (Tacoma) to Vashon Island.
- 9** There are various shellfish enhancement projects going on at the Tribe's tidelands. Do not harvest any of the shellfish in areas marked with RED stakes
- 10** Tribal members, 18 years and older, can get an Oyster Harvest Permit from the Fisheries office. Permits are not issued at the beach.

Auburn Trojans beat Rainier Beach for first Class 3A state boys basketball title

TACOMA — Auburn knew that to win its first state boys basketball title, it would have to go through the top teams in the Metro League to get it.

Check, check and check.

The second-seeded Trojans beat their third Metro League team in three days, defeating Rainier Beach 58-48 in a Saturday night grand finale at the Tacoma Dome, denying Viking coach Mike Bethea a ninth Class 3A state title that would have extended his record.

“Everyone says the gold ball goes to the Metro League, and to be able to (beat) three Metro teams in a row, it was tough and it was a grind, and our kids really had to compete,” Auburn coach Ryan Hansen said.

Metro teams have won every Class 3A title since 2011 and only one non-Metro team had played in the title game in that span (Mt. Spokane in 2019). That was the history Auburn was up against as they became only the fourth non-Metro team since 2000 to win the Class 3A boys title.

Auburn (27-2) knocked off No. 1 seed Garfield in an overtime thriller in the quarterfinals, took down No. 5 seed Seattle Prep in the semifinals and then came 10-time state champ Rainier Beach (21-5), the fourth seed, in the title game.

“To get through a storied program like Garfield and to get through a storied program like Rainier Beach and Seattle Prep, I am just so proud of these guys,” Coach Hansen said.

“We went through every frickin’ Metro team to get here,” said Kaden Hansen, who led Auburn with 18 points. “We went the hardest way we had to. That’s what made us champions!”

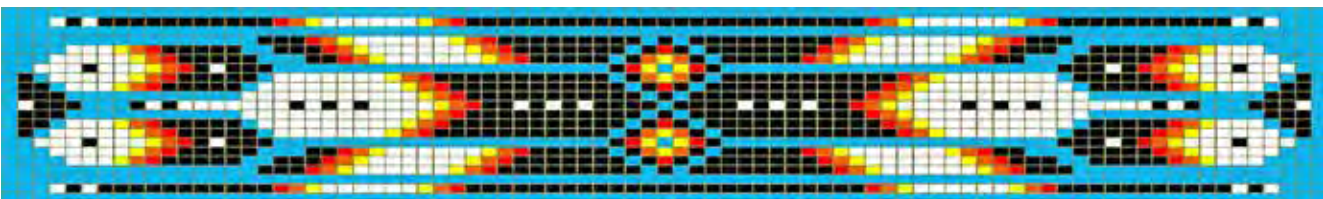

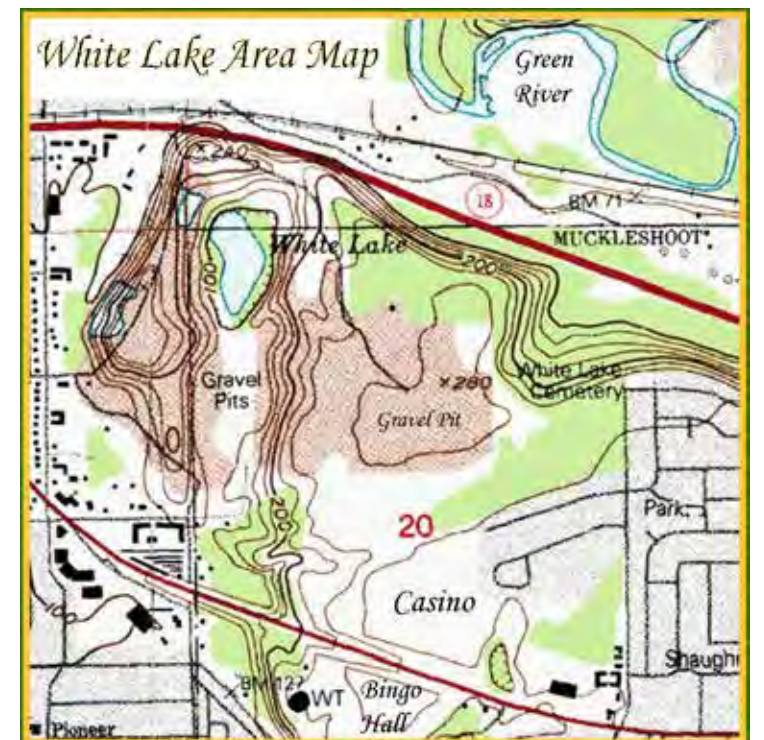

HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA (HS+) FAQs

Educational goals to get your high school diploma?

No better time to start than on the first day of spring!

Muckleshoot Tribal College and Renton Technical College's High School Diploma program (HS+) allows adult students gain credit for life experiences.

Questions about if this program is for you? Email Justine.Koble@muckleshoot.nsn.us or call (253) 876-3375.

- What are the credit requirements for the program?
 - o The credit requirements vary depending on what year you were supposed to have graduated. For example: If you were supposed to graduate originally in 2010 you would have needed 20 credits. The program accepts students with zero high school credits.
- What types of credits count toward graduation?
 - o The credits that count have to come from classes accepted by Washington State for graduation. Life experiences such as certificates and licenses may count as high school credit. Unfortunately, some classes, such as Life Skills, some electives, and labs, don't count for this program. Your instructor will inform you as to what counts for credit, and what may not.
- How do I find out how many credits I have?
 - o The first step is to get a copy of your high school transcript from the last high school you attended. This will show how many credits you earned, what year you were set to graduate, and which classes you were given credit for. After obtaining your transcript, schedule an appointment with your instructor to verify qualification and to register.
- How do I make up the missing credits?
 - o This program is "competency" based which means you are given credit for those subjects you can prove you can do. Competency can be proven in many different ways; assigned coursework, completed tests, certificates, certifications, licenses, videos, writing, directed exercises, previous GED tests passed, online, classes, work history, self-employment, etc


HS+ FAQ's Continued

- If I need a class, where will I take it?
 - o If it is decided a class is needed, it can be taken where ever it is offered or online. In most cases we can make arrangements for you to finish everything here at the Muckleshoot Tribal College (MIT) with the HS+/GED instructor. Taking classes online through Renton Technical College (RTC) on Canvas is common.
- What support will I get while in this program?
 - o Because it is a partnership with Renton Technical College, one of their instructors will direct you on what you need to prove competency. They will be available virtually. Also, the instructors here at MTC are available to assist you in your assignments from RTC and collecting what you need for submittal and presentation to the RTC instructor.
- Who issues my high school diploma?
 - o The high school diploma itself is issued through Renton Technical College in accordance with Washington State requirements. After completing your credits, a diploma will be mailed to you in 4 to 6 weeks.
- What is the time frame in finishing this program?
 - o There is no set answer to this question. This will depend on the amount and kinds of credits you need and the time and effort put into finishing the assignments given by the instructor. Those students who have missed a year or more of school will typically take longer to complete the program, depending on how long they have been out of school. The average time is about three + months. We recommend committing at least 9 hours a week to your studies.
- Are there any costs?
 - o The program is free to Muckleshoot Tribal Members

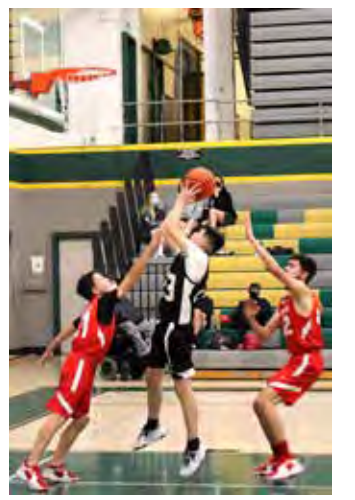
Muckleshoot Kraken take championship in Portland tourney

Tenant Rights During COVID-19 Pandemic Washington State Landlord Requirements

The COVID-19 Pandemic has resulted in financial distress to many families. Job losses, unemployment, and reduced hours can make paying rent difficult. Washington State has issued several Proclamations during this time to provide extra protections to tenants to assist in preserving housing. Effective immediately, and until June 4, 2020, please be aware of these changes:

Notices to Vacate & Evictions
Landlords currently cannot serve, enforce or threaten residents with notices to vacate the premises. This includes resident's whose contract has expired or will expire during the Proclamation period. The tenancy would continue on a month-to-month basis.

Your landlord can take action if your household has engaged in activities that threaten the health or safety of the neighborhood or dwelling unit.

Charging Late Fees
Landlords currently cannot charge, or threaten to charge, late fees for the non-payment of rent or other charges associated with a rental unit. This applies to any fees that have occurred on or after February 29, 2020. Landlords cannot attempt collection through agencies, unlawful detainer or other judicial actions, withhold any portion of security deposits or report debts to credit bureaus. Residents and landlords must work together to establish reasonable payment plans based on the individual's financial, health, and other circumstances.

Rent or Deposit Increases
Landlords cannot increase your rent or deposit at this time. This applies to contract renewals and month-to-month contracts. The rent charged on April 15, 2020 should be the rent charged today and through the Governor's Orders. If you were charged an increased rent after this date, you are entitled to a refund of the overpayment.

If you are unable to pay your rent, make sure you communicate with your landlord. If you are not materially affected by COVID-19, you must continue to pay rent to avoid unnecessary and avoidable economic hardship to landlords, property owners, and managers.

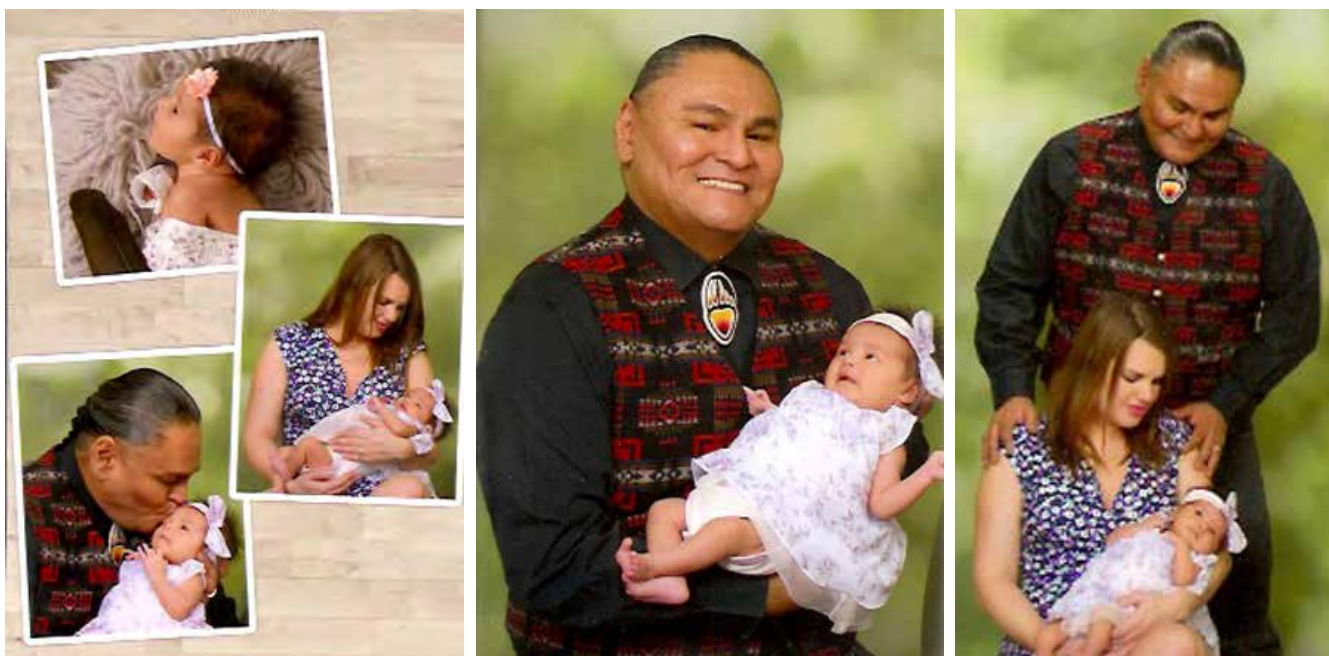
