TRIBE CHOOSES ITS LEADERS

Virginia Cross, Leeroy Courville Jr. and Jessica Garcia top an excellent field of candidates

Think fast! Who was the last NEW member elected to the Tribal Council? Hint: This individual was described in the paper as being “new blood.” The answer will be at the end. (Don’t peek!)

A vigorous and spirited campaign season came to its conclusion when the polls closed at 8:00 PM on Monday, January 16, 2023. After four consecutive elections where all three incumbents were sent back for another term, the Muckleshoot Tribal Council now has a new member.

He is Leeroy Courville Jr., who is proudly following in the footsteps his late father, Leeroy Courville Sr., a long-time council member who was well-known for his hard work and dedication to the community, a friend to all.



Virginia Cross

Virginia Cross again led the balloting, finishing with 368 votes, followed by Leeroy with 345 and Jessica Garcia with 339.

Three-term incumbent Jeremy James finished fourth with 259 votes. Jeremy was first elected in 2014, and we join the entire Muckleshoot community in thanking him for his hard work, dedication and many accomplishments during his nine years in office.

Brysen Jansen also topped the 200-vote mark with 221 votes, and Darren Redthunder came close with 197. Andrew Burdette also topped 100, earning 136 votes. Rounding out the field were Rhonda Harnden (87), Leo V. LaClair (69) and Hailey Joe (67).

The Muckleshoot Tribal Council consists of nine members. Elections are held annually on the third Monday in January,

with three seats up for election each year. Members serve three-year terms. Swearing-in ceremonies for this year’s electees – Virginia Cross, Leeroy Courville Jr. and Jessica Garcia – will take place in April. Friends and family are invited to attend. A light lunch will be served.

Seattle waterfront streets could get honorary name elevating tribal history

With the massive Seattle waterfront construction project, there is a proposal to give Alaskan Way and Elliott Way the honorary name Dzidzilalich, recognizing the tribal village that once stood there.

A section of Seattle’s waterfront streets may soon get an honorary name that acknowledges the lands and history of the Puget Sound Coast Salish people.

Under the proposal, Alaskan Way and Elliott Way, between South Dearborn and Bell streets, would be given the honorary street name Dzidzilalich (pronounced dzee-dzuhlah-leech), recognizing the tribal village that once stood there.

Alaskan Way and Elliott Way will remain the legal street names, and addresses will not change, city officials said. But if the plan goes through, each green intersection street sign will include a brown street sign with “Dzidzilalich” posted underneath. New interpretive signage will also be placed

along the waterfront, detailing information about local tribal history and culture.

Meaning “little crossing-over place” in the Salishan language of Lushootseed, Dzidzilalich is likely a reference to a narrow sandspit between the beach and a nearby lagoon, with homes located on either end, according to Warren King George, a historian at the Muckleshoot Tribe.

Pre-contact, the village was a bustling community of foragers, fishermen and hunters along the marshy shore of Elliott Bay, King George said. Low tide would expose acres and acres of coastal wetlands, revealing an abundance of mussels, clams and crabs. Vast beds of eelgrass, now gone along Seattle’s modern waterfront shoreline, grew in the muddy, shallow waters, providing vital spawning grounds for Pacific herring.

Long before the ferry terminal and the Great Wheel, before the skyscrapers and concrete roads, generations of tribal families who lived along the waterfront called the place Dzidzilalich, King George said. Today, the tidal flat is in the vicinity of King Street Station.

“It’s powerful to use the traditional language, because that language is ancient, our landscape is ancient, and our way of life is ancient,” said Leonard Forsman, chair of the Suquamish Tribe. “To bring that spirit back to Seattle, which is named after our chief, only seemed appropriate and authentic,” he said.

(The grave of Sealth, known as Chief Seattle, is located on the Suquamish Tribe’s Port Madison Reservation in north Kitsap County, a short distance from his home at Old Man House Park, which was the site of their tribe’s largest Bighouse until the government burned it down in 1870.)

Honoring Indigenous history along Seattle’s waterfront

Seattle is considering adding the honorary name “Dzidzilalich” to a stretch of the city’s waterfront. Meaning “little crossing-over place” in Lushootseed, one of the languages of the Coast Salish people, the name refers to one of the several fishing villages once located in the area.

about a year ago, said Marshall Foster, director of the city’s Office of the Waterfront and Civic Projects.

“A lot of Seattleites use the waterfront, and have a life here, yet don’t realize the tribal history and culture that lies beneath their feet,” Foster said.

“I think it’s important to acknowledge that we didn’t forget about Dzidzilalich – it’s our neighbors who forgot about Dzidzilalich,” King George said. “I think it’s a step in the right direction, but we can always make more of an effort to honor that history.”

First Native American woman in space steps out on spacewalk

The first Native American woman in space continued her amazing adventure when he ventured out of the International Space Station on a spacewalk on January 20 to do some setup work so it can be equipped with additional solar panels.

Mann, a Marine colonel and former test pilot, rocketed into orbit last fall with SpaceX, becoming the first Native American woman in space. She is a member of the Wailacki of the Round Valley Indian Tribes in Northern California. It’s hard to imagine a life more thrilling than the one she’s led, and she’s still young.

A list of Nicole’s remarkable accomplishments to date include being a graduate of Stanford University and the US Naval Academy and a pilot of the F/A-18 Hornet, an aircraft that is so sleek and fast that it could be mistaken for a star fighter from Star Wars. She’s logged more than 2,500 flight hours in 25 kinds of planes as a test pilot, made 200 aircraft carrier landings, and flew 47 combat missions in Afghanistan and Iraq before completing her astronaut training in 2015.

Nicole Mann clearly can do anything she sets her mind to. She’s like the rodeo people that say “I can ride anything with hair.” She is an inspiration to Native youth, truly proving that there’s nothing you can’t do if you believe in yourself and go after it with all you’ve got.

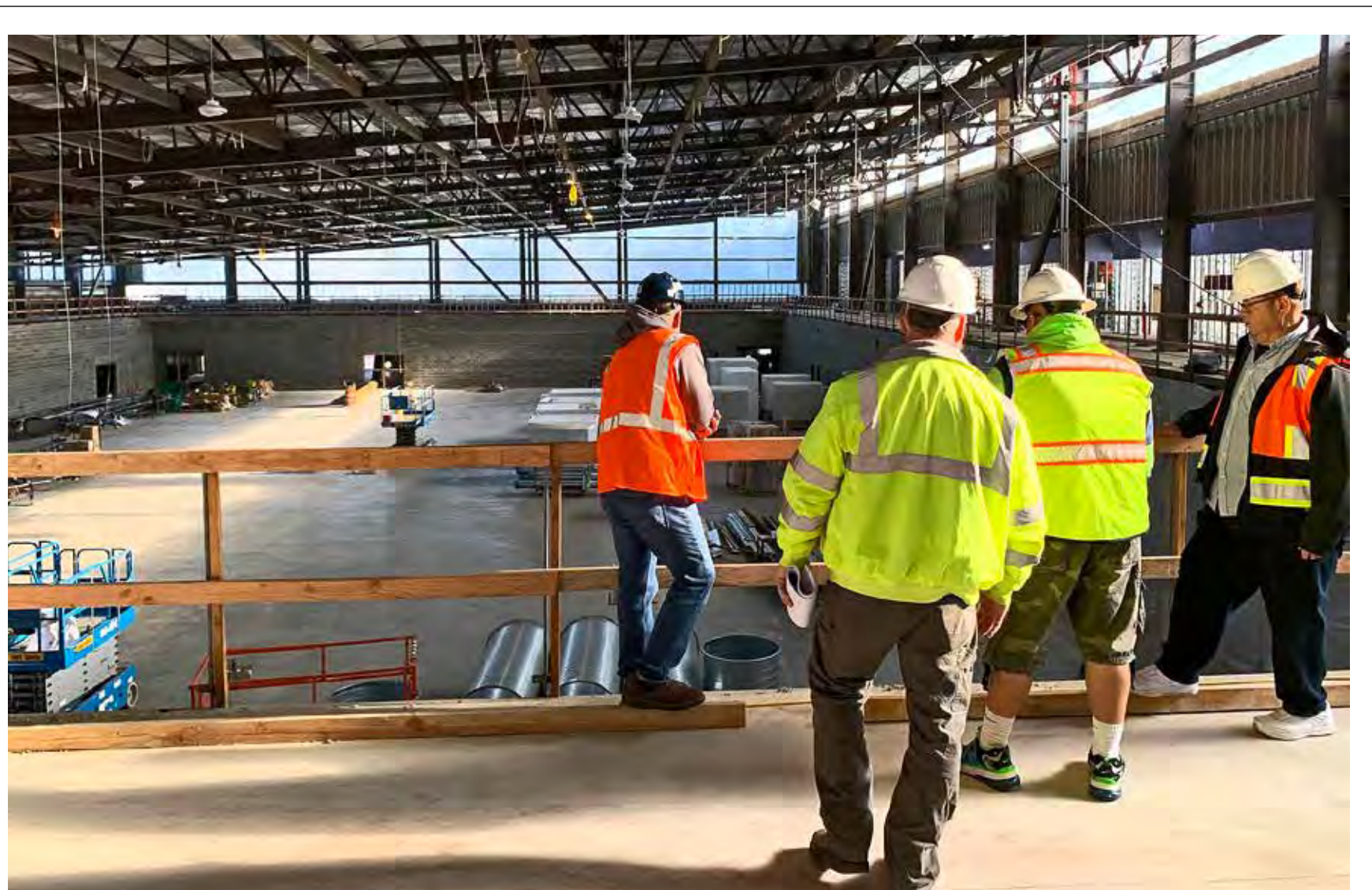

Emerald Downs Announces 2023 Stakes Schedule

MUCKLESHOOT GOLD CUP INDIAN RELAY RACES SCHEDULED FOR FATHER'S DAY WEEKEND

AUBURN, Wash. – Emerald Downs has announced 23 stakes worth \$1,240,000 in purses for its 2023 live racing season that begins Kentucky Derby Day, Saturday, May 6.

The prestigious Muckleshoot Gold Cup Indian Relay Race Championships have been confirmed for Father's Day Weekend, June 16-18. There are several relay race championships in the West, but none is farther west than this one! Mark your calendars!

Admission to Emerald Downs is always free for Native families, any tribe, any day. One person should show a valid ID from a federally recognized tribe.

The 88th running of the \$150,000 Longacres Mile anchors an August 13 stakes quadruple-header featuring the \$50,000 Emerald Distaff, the \$50,000 Muckleshoot Derby, and the \$50,000 Washington Oaks.

The track's premier event for 3-year-olds and up, the Longacres Mile was captured in 2022 by KD Thoroughbreds Slew's Tiz Whiz over Lusk Racing's Papa's Golden Boy as Washington-breds took down the top two spots.

The older horse division, 4 years and up, begins with the \$50,000 Budweiser Stakes (6F) on Sunday, June 25, followed by the \$50,000 Governor's Stakes (6 ½ F) on Sunday, July 23, and the Longacres Mile.

The 2023 stakes schedule features eight stakes double-headers, the Super Sunday quadruple-header August 14, and a closing day triple-header Sunday, Sept. 17, featuring the \$70,000 Gottstein Futurity for the Northwest's top 2-year-olds.

The \$50,000 Seattle Stakes for 3-year-old fillies and \$50,000 Auburn Stakes for 3-year-old colts and geldings kick off stakes action on Sunday, June 18.

Seven stakes are offered for 2-year-olds – three apiece for fillies and colts and geldings – finishing with the Gottstein Futurity at a mile and one-sixteenth.

Washington Cup features four stakes – the \$50,000 Washington Cup Juvenile Colts & Geldings and \$50,000 Washington Cup and \$50,000 Washington Cup Juvenile Fillies on Sunday, August 27, and the \$50,000 Muckleshoot Tribal Classic and \$50,000 Washington Cup Fillies & Mares on Sunday, September 17.

In addition to 21 Thoroughbred stakes, Emerald Downs offers two stakes for Quarter Horses – the \$30,000 John Deere Juvenile Challenge Championship for 2-year-olds and the 14th running of the \$40,000 Bank of America Emerald Championship Challenge for 3-year-olds and up.

Opening day for the 2022 season is Saturday, May 6, coinciding with the 149th Kentucky Derby. The 52-day meet concludes Sunday, September 17.

NARCAN COULD SAVE THE LIFE OF SOMEONE YOU LOVE

We have all been eagerly awaiting the opening up of public events again; Pow Wows, Healing Dinners, trainings, sober support groups, and even committee meetings.

While we have spent the last 2+ years of our lives in suspended animation, and even the Covid pandemic has decreased, the opioid epidemic and ensuing overdoses in King County increased 39% between 2020 and 2021 and continued to rise in 2022 as well as into 2023.

A majority of those overdose deaths have been attributed to the influx of fentanyl, which has been involved in 70% of all confirmed overdose deaths in 2022. King County Emergency Medical Services treated 5,835 overdoses in 2022, while a total of 1,019 people passed as the result of overdose.

While we distributed over 1,500 Narcan kits and held trainings for over 1,000 community members in 2022 through our SAMHSA First Responders grant, it doesn't feel like we are doing enough. Overdose deaths in the Muckleshoot community feel very personal to each of us at Behavioral Health Program and those have also been climbing.

We will be pushing harder in 2023 to get Narcan kits into every household and business place in this community. We already have received training requests at some of the Tribal Government entities and enterprises and held a Healing Dinner to recognize the losses in our community from overdose deaths, to increase awareness of the dangers of fentanyl and distribute Narcan kits.

There should never be a time when someone passes from overdose as the result of not having a Narcan kit handy. We will also have informational tables providing education for parents on what to look for, healthy relationships, Medication Assisted Treatment and incentives for completing a brief survey. It's time to recognize those we have lost and be a part of the solution "How do we prevent any further loss?"

Food was served, as were many, many questions, which the Muckleshoot team led by Culture Director Stephanie James did their best to answer. As Muckleshoot learned from its previous hosting, 17 years ago in 2006, being host to the Canoe Journey is an epic undertaking. This is clearly a labor of love for all involved. No single event has contributed more to the ongoing revitalization of Northwest Coastal Culture than the Canoe Journey.



The climax of the afternoon was the transfer of the ceremonial staff from the previous host to the this summer's host, which was an event that embraced some sadness and grieving as well as love and good wishes. The Tla'Amin Nation of Powell River, BC has held the ceremonial staff since 2021. They were excited to host the journey that year, but Covid-19 had other plans. The Canoe Journey was cancelled in both 2021 and 2022. The passing of the staff was bittersweet at best for the Tla'Amin people, but they carried themselves with grace and beauty as they transferred it to Muckleshoot.

Needless to say, there is much to be done. Hosting the Canoe Journey is a high honor, and an unforgettable experience for those who participate. Step up if you are interested.

Passing of the Staff

The following words were spoken by Drew Blaney (Kespahl) of the Tla'Amin Nation of Powell River, BC, followed by the ceremonial passing of the Canoe Journey Staff from Tla-Amin council member Erik Manathey to Stephanie James, accepting on behalf of the Muckleshoot Tribe.

“We were on schedule to host the Tribal Journey in 2021. Of course, we had to cancel due to COVID 19. And we were really saddened that we had to cancel that because we know what this journey means to all of our people. But, we did it to keep everybody safe, our elders, our young people, and we still think that was the right decision to cancel that event.

So, we know a big part of Tribal Journey is the passing of the staff here which has been passed from host to host for many years.

So, we're here to do our part to pass along this Tribal Journey staff to the host of Tribal Journeys 2023, Muckleshoot. We're so excited to travel down from your territory to your shores. We always have such an amazing time down here.

When we accepted this Tribal Journey staff back in 2020, we accepted this in Snuneymuxw from Chief Mike [sounds like] Wyse [sounds like] and his council. And it was accepted by our former Chief, Clint Williams, and one of our Council members, Tyrone Wilson. And when we think of honoring our warriors this year, we are very unfortunate to have lost Tyrone, one of our elected leaders, to COVID 19.

So, when we paddle this summer, we are going to paddle in honor of our warrior, our elected leader, Tyrone Wilson, who was there when we accepted this staff. So, we just want to share a quick song here and I have my family? here. This is my older brother here, tiyaphot, Erik Blaney, He is one of our elected leaders of our nation and Lori Wilson, also one of our elected leaders. And I stand here again with my mother Gail, my sister Sosan and my nieces and nephews here.

And so, we're going to share a song before we pass this Tribal Journey staff to Muckleshoot. And we're going to sing our warrior song and if anybody wants to get up and do a warrior dance, you're more than welcome.”



New South Lake Union Canoe Carving House will showcase Native culture

More than 150 years after Seattle's government tried to ban Native residents and more than 50 years after Native activists embarked on a campaign to regain waterfront access in the city, a space dedicated to Coast Salish canoe culture is about to take shape on the shore of Lake Union.

The United Indians of All Tribes Foundation recently held a ceremony to bless the construction site of the new Canoe Carving House, which is scheduled to break ground later this year. The 1,200 square-foot structure on the western edge of Lake Union Park will be a place to carve, store, launch and educate visitors about traditional canoes made from cedar trees.

Located in the middle of tech-powered Seattle, below a thicket of glass and steel towers, the Canoe Carving House should serve as a reminder, says Mike Tulee, executive director of United Indians, that Native people have always lived in the city.

In one sense, the \$4.7 million project dates to 1970, when Native activists like Bernie Whitebear staged a nonviolent takeover at Fort Lawton in an attempt to secure land the federal government was trying to give away. The occupation of what became Discovery Park birthed United Indians of All Tribes, which led to the creation of the Daybreak Star Indian Cultural Center – sometimes called “The House that Bernie built.”

Daybreak Star has a beautiful view of the Salish Sea from high atop Magnolia Bluff, but lacks water access. Efforts to find a nearby site to provide that access began during Bernie Whitebear's time and ultimately has been realized under Tulee, one of his successors.

“I started talking with city officials, county officials, state officials,” said Tulee, an enrolled member of Yakama Nation with Coast Salish roots through his mother. “Little by little, they came around.”

The project is also connected to deeper history. Most people who visit Seattle and many who live here don't know that before non-Native people came, “there were 17 villages in this area and 93 longhouses,” Tulee said.

At that time, canoes were “the primary method of transportation for our people, whether traveling in the rivers, the lakes, the Salish Sea or the ocean,” with a special type of canoe for each type of waterway, said Willard Bill Jr., a Muckleshoot enrollee who is a direct descendant of Cheshiahud (Cheh-Shee-AH-Hood), a historical figure also known as Lake John, who resided on Lake Union and is today the namesake of a trail that circles the lake.

The Point Elliott Treaty of 1855 compelled many Native people to move to reservations, and non-Native Seattle leaders even passed a short-lived law in 1865 banning Native people from living in the city. But Cheshiahud, a close friend of local leaders such as

David Denny, managed to live by Lake Union into the 20th century.

That history is a “key piece for me,” said Bill Jr., who grew up in Seattle and is a canoe skipper with the Muckleshoot Tribe. “It's so critical for our young people to have access and also for the general public ... to access authentic Native culture from this area.”

The new structure will be a “contemporary interpretation of a longhouse,” with large timbers, cedar cladding, a large room for indoor carving and an overhang for outdoor carving, said Bruce Arnold from Jones & Jones Architects. The building will also have a staff room, restrooms and a planted roof where blue camas will blossom each spring.

United Indians will operate the Canoe Carving House, with some details still in the works, Tulee said. There will be carving demonstrations and classes, with experts to teach visitors about Coast Salish canoes, he said. The structure is steps from a gravel beach where canoes will come ashore and depart.

The project is using city, county, state and federal funds, with construction scheduled to occur between fall 2023 and fall 2024, according to the city's Parks Department. A second building, to be called the Welcome House, is also envisioned for the site. It will house educational displays, a kitchen and an events space. Together, the Canoe Carving House and Welcome House would be known as the Northwest Native Canoe Center.

There was a period when Coast Salish carving as a way of life almost ceased, according to Will Bill, yet the practice survived and is making a comeback, he said.

“Turning a chunk of cedar into a canoe is hard work, but paddling a hand-carved canoe through the water is a special experience,” said Tyson Simmons, a Muckleshoot carver. “I don't think there's anything better.”

He should know, because he actually carved and launched a cedar canoe under the tutelage of master carver Marvin Starr Sr. before the esteemed Muckleshoot elder passed away several years ago. Simmons expects to spend time at the new Canoe Carving House and said he hopes the “long overdue” Seattle project helps sustain his craft.

“We're still here,” he said, “and we're still carving.”

A persistent problem we are seeing is abandoned vehicles, trash and other waste illegally dumped, that can pollute the area. The Tribe and local Enforcement Authorities are working towards reducing illegal dumping activity and homeless encampments. The trash that these encampments and dumping produce, can create serious public health concerns including possibly causing serious disease, an increase in pests, can contain IV needles, other "unsanitary conditions" and an increase disposal cost\$ to Tribal entities.

That being said, we could use your help. If you see illegally dumped garbage, vehicles and especially something suspicious, such as someone dumping trash or vehicles, or an illegal camp, please contact a responsible official. Try to obtain a vehicle/person description, license plate, location etc. - but please don't put yourself in "harm's way." Please see contact list below. 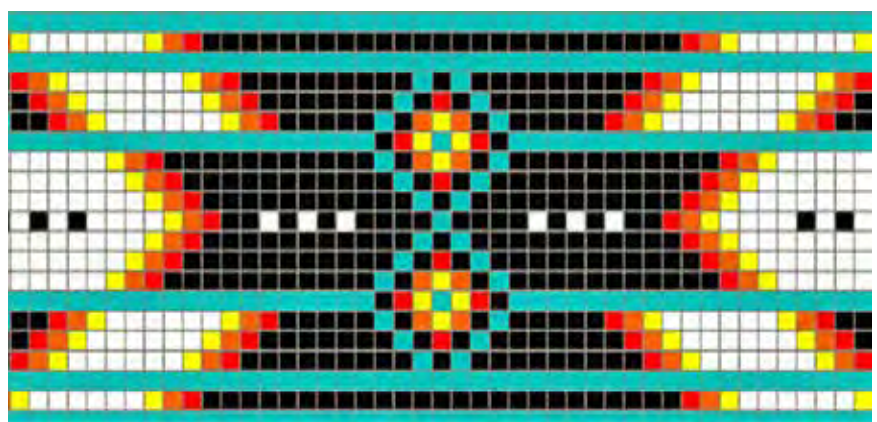

I. FACTUAL BACKGROUND

- Petitioner Muckleshoot Indian Tribe is a federally recognized Tribe governing the Muckleshoot Indian Reservation. Pursuant to its sovereign powers to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the Reservation Community, the Tribe has enacted Chapter 4.02: Nuisance.
- The respondent are Alfred White Eagle Jr., Estate of Veronica Sue White Eagle, Estate of Jaclyn Redding, Estate of Jeremiah White Eagle, Timothy White Eagle, Victoria Lynn White Eagle, Ronnie Eugene Brown, Breanna Sue Brown, Lavonna Ronelle White Eagle-Brown, Martina Dlynn Delgado, Cecelia Judith Delgado, Andres Gerardo Delgado, Jose Vidal Guzman Rosales, Wesley Exum, Edith Price, as well as all squatters on the property hereby known as Parcel 16-A located at 14708 SE 368th PI, Auburn, WA 980092. The property (16-A) is illegally occupied. A BIA lease does not exist to provide the occupants the right to reside on the property, therefore, all of these squatters are trespassing and do not have legal permission to reside on this land. Further, this property has garbage in the yard, including a refrigerator and drug paraphernalia. The porch is rotten, in a dangerous condition, and is a hazard to the public and occupants. Numerous vehicles are on the property, including at least one stolen vehicle. A trailer on the property is occupied without utility services. The property hosts illicit drug use and criminal activity. Occupant, Wesley Exum has multiple warrants including a \$1,000 bench warrant from Muckleshoot Tribal Court and a \$5,000 warrant for Failure to Appear from King County District Court on a Domestic Violent Assault charge. Occupant, Cecelia Delgado has two warrants for her arrest for Failure to Appear from King County District Court on Possession of Drug Paraphernalia charges. Occupant, Edith Price has two warrants for her arrest for Failure to Appear from King County District Court on Possession of Drug Paraphernalia charges.
- The Tribe has taken numerous steps to seek the cooperation of the responsible parties to voluntarily abate the nuisance. Listed below are some of the efforts made by Tribal departments:
 - ☐ On 08/17/2022, Lead Probation Officer, Jolene Agostini of the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe’s Probation Department and Tribal Code Enforcement Officer, Lenny Sneatium visited the property. Agostini explained nuisance violations that exist on the property to occupants, Cecelia Delgado and Timothy White Eagle. Specifically, the garbage surrounding the residence, including a refrigerator, several non-running vehicles, and a trailer used as a residence. Agostini provided a copy of the Nuisance Code and explained to Cecelia and Timothy, they would have to relocate within 14 days.
 - ☐ On 08/30/2022, Agostini met with Respondent, Brianna Brown-Jackson. Agostini explained based on the Nuisance Code, that Timothy White Eagle would not be able to continue to reside in the trailer on the property. Brianna explained that Wesley Exum Jr. and Edith Price moved into the residence and did not have permission to reside on the property.
 - ☐ On 9/1/2022, Agostini posted a Notice to Vacate and Abate Nuisance on the trailer and on a post in front of the house. Agostini could not affix the notice to the front door of the house due to safety concerns caused by the dangerous condition of the front porch. The notice directed the respondents to cease occupancy/residence and remove nuisance property before 09/15/22.
 - ☐ On 9/29/2022, Agostini returned to the property with King County Deputies and posted several Second Notices stating, “This is the 2nd notice to remind you that your current use and occupancy of the lands listed above violates tribal law and must cease. On 10/17/22, the Tribe will exercise its codified authority to vacate these properties and abate the nuisances.”
 - ☐ On 9/29/2022, King County Deputies located a stolen vehicle under the back carport and discovered numerous drug paraphernalia on the property.

II. LEGAL AUTHORITY

- Chapter 4.02 Nuisance:**
 Respondents’ actions and property constitute a nuisance as provided in Muckleshoot Tribal Code Chapter 4.02. For example:
 - § 4.02.030(a) Causing the carcass of any animal or refuse, garbage, scrap metal or lumber, concrete, asphalt, tires, and piles of earth, not including compost, or like substance, or the presence of any material in a dwelling or adjacent thereto that makes the dwelling unsanitary or unsafe, to be collected, deposited, or remain in any place or in any dwelling to the prejudice of others or that creates a threat to the health and safety of persons or their quiet enjoyment of property;
 - § 4.2.030(b) Erecting or continuing to maintain any structure or object that is in a dangerous condition or is an attractive enticement to children and that in its present condition is a substantial danger to children;
 - § 4.2.030(d) Causing two (2) or more abandoned vehicles, wrecked, dismantled, or inoperative vehicles or remnant parts thereof as herein defined to be collected, deposited, or remain in any place to the prejudice of others,
 - § 4.2.030(e) Causing any chest, refrigerator, appliance, or other container not in active use, any door to which has a latch or lock that automatically fastens upon the door being closed and that cannot be readily opened from the inside, to be collected, deposited, or remain in any place to the prejudice of others.
 - § 4.02.030(f) Causing, permitting, or allowing criminal activity, to include unlawful drug use, possession, manufacturing, selling or distributing anywhere on property or within any dwelling.
 - § 4.02.030(g) Causing, permitting or allowing any activity or condition that poses an immediate threat to public health or safety, or that of the occupants of the property.
 - § 4.02.030(h) Causing, permitting or allowing the occupancy of any dwelling without installed, permitting and approved adequate, basic utility services including, but not limited to, the presence of water service, sewer or on-site sanitation system, and electricity.

If the Nuisance is contested, the Tribe intends to rely upon testimony by police, probation, and trust services, as well as incident reports, declarations, photos, property and trust information, to support the Tribe’s case.

III. REQUEST FOR RELIEF

The Petitioner, Muckleshoot Indian Tribe, hereby requests that the Court set an Abatement Hearing. Respondent Jose Guzman Rosales is permanently excluded from the Reservation. He should be directed to appear by Zoom/telephone or will need to arrange an escort to and from the Court.

If at the hearing on the Petition, the Court finds by preponderance of the evidence that the complained of nuisance and violations exist, the Tribe requests an order including the following provisions:

- Respondents shall remove all drug paraphernalia, garbage, and appliances, located on Tract 109 16-A;
- Respondents shall remove any vehicles and trailers located on Tract 109 16-A;
- Respondents and all occupants or squatters lacking BIA lease or other legal permission to reside on the premises shall vacate;
- Should Respondents fail to remove all drug paraphernalia, garbage, appliances, vehicles and trailers within 14 days, the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe is authorized to take reasonable actions necessary to abate the violations, including but not limited to removing all drug paraphernalia, garbage, appliances, vehicles and trailers, and any property left behind, all costs incurred shall be the paid by the Respondents;
- Should Respondents fail to vacate the premises within 14 days, the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe is authorized to remove any occupants, and/or cite them for trespass; and
- Any other relief the Court deems appropriate.

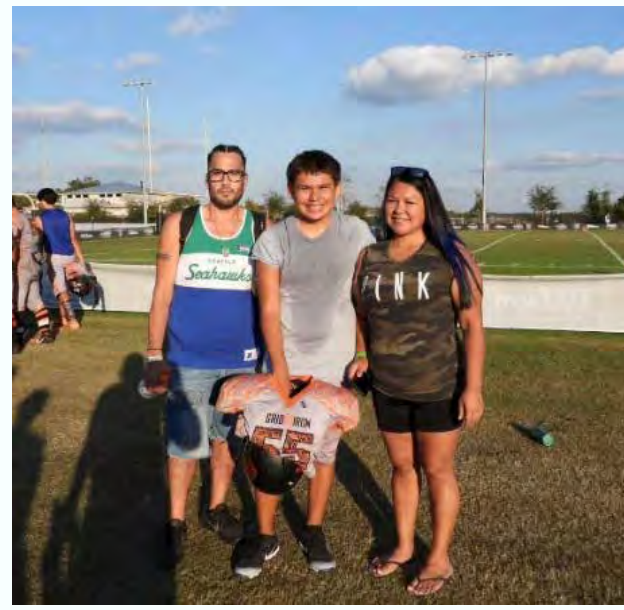
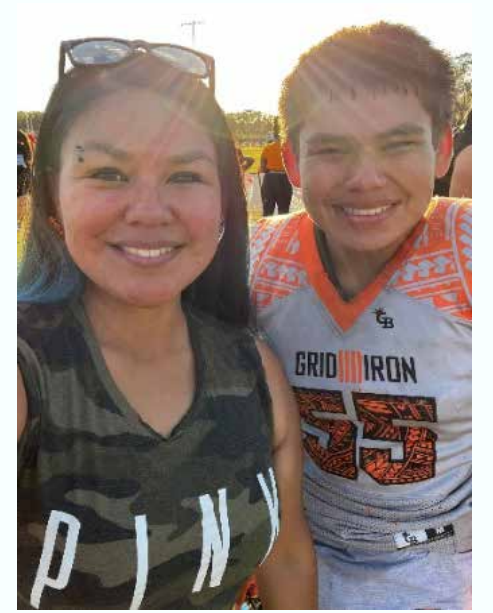
