Fighting brings Shane White Eagle closer to his culture and helped him grow into a leader. He exemplifies the warrior spirit and represents his family, his team, and the Muckleshoot Tribe. Here's Shane, in his own words:

A Warrior... that's something that we are. It's something we've been doing forever, since the beginning of time. We're all warriors. Whether you're a gatherer or whether you're a hunter, we're a tribe. We work together. We've stuck together. We've been resilient from the beginning. Just the fact that we're still here proves that.

When I first got into this sport, there's this ignorance out there, where it's just seen as brawling; but I quickly realized that I needed to have this self-control that I've never had to have in any other sport. It's made me comfortable being uncomfortable. It's not just about fighting. It's "Can I be a father?" "Can I be a husband?" Can I be a community member?"

Yeah, my wife's definitely a warrior. People think warriors are the ones that are out in battle, but it's the ones that can make things happen at home, or for the village. In today's society, it's easy to get disconnected. Fighting has brought me closer to my culture. Fighting has grounded me. I'm connected to everything. And culturally, that's the way that we carry ourselves.

My blood is rich with Native blood, being Makah and Muckleshoot. For me to come back home and connect with my people... there's a lot of things that I feel like I can help with our people by the way that I carry myself, and I think fighting is the way that I can do that.

I think having the tribe support me is everything. I have my mini-tribe at home with my family and my kids and they allow me to do what I do. I have my actual tribe, Muckleshoot, that supports me and allows me to chase this highest level of competition, and I have my team that I work with on a day-to-day basis that prepares me for these moments and keeps me on point. It's humbling.

Our people are resilient and they've gone through harder things than what I'm going through right now, and especially in the last few years, when I've been a part of a lot of funerals and a lot of passing of family members. So, it's almost like this is a way to step up and be a leader for our people. A Warrior.





Kraken add Muckleshoot Tribe to jersey with new art and youth sports initiative

The Seattle Kraken added the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe's seal to its jerseys Feb. 22 in a first for the National Hockey League. Tribal Chairman Jaison Elkins was the first to don the jersey at the Kraken Community Iceplex in Northgate.

The Muckleshoot Indian Tribe's official seal will appear on the Seattle Kraken jersey this year, representing a deal between the two organizations to launch art and youth programs and build a multisport court on the Muckleshoot Reservation.

The tribe is the first jersey partner for the young franchise, which was established in 2018 and began playing in the NHL in 2021. Seattle will also be the first major North American men's sports franchise to have a tribal logo on its jersey.

"We launched our franchise with an eye to the future as well as an acknowledgment of the past," Kraken CEO Tod Leiweke said in a news

release. "This partnership manifests our gratitude and respect for the Muckleshoot People, past and present, who are the ancestral keepers of the land upon which Climate Pledge Arena sits and we play."

The partnership between the two dates back to when the Muckleshoot Canoe Family singers performed a blessing in the early stages of construction on the arena. The tribe has also been a broadcast sponsor for the team during power plays.

"The Muckleshoot Indian Tribe is proud to begin this first-of-its-kind partnership with the Kraken, who worked with us from day one to acknowledge that Climate Pledge Arena is located on our ancestral homeland and to honor our enduring place in the cultural fabric of this region," said Muckleshoot Tribal Chairman Jaison Elkins.

"This joyful day brings with it a sense of hope that our young people will see themselves represented by the team in the heart of Seattle and around the country with our Tribe's logo on the front of every Kraken jersey."

He is a Psychotherapist, Clinical Supervisor and former Program Development Supervisor at Cowlitz Tribal Health in Seattle where he worked for 11 years. He also has a private consultation practice and



is the owner of Redtail Consulting, a consulting group dedicated to Mental Health issues in Indian Country. By thinking outside the box and within the circle he is able to take a different approach to issues that pertain to his community. He is married to a wonderful woman whose family comes from the White Earth Reservation (Chippewa, Mississippi Band) in Minnesota and they have 3 children together.

Seth is passionate about unlearning the traditional and mainstream tenets he learned in graduate school and changing the paradigm of mainstream mental health in Indian Country. He worked mostly with kids in middle and high school and their families (aunties, uncles, cousins etc.). His program, AMR (All My Relations), facilitated several Anger Management/Processing groups, and experiential outdoor groups. He believes that relationship is everything in Indian Country and was a significant part of his upbringing.

In his opinion, all clinical work is systemic and it takes a community approach to be effective in Indian Country, so he strives to incorporate any and all people who are important to his kids' lives. He ran many groups that included deer and elk hunting, gathering (plants, berries etc.), camping, hiking, fishing, snowboarding, canoe journey and sweatlodge. Each activity supported the growth of the person he was working with and related directly to their therapeutic, personal, and cultural goals as an individual, a family member, a tribal member, and as a member within the larger community.

Seth has worked on many programs on the Puyallup, Nisqually, Muckleshoot and Cowlitz Indian Reservations and at Muckleshoot Tribal School, Chief Leschi, and Wa He Lut Indian School.

I've always loved being up at Muckleshoot, the people and the culture. I've always felt welcome up here and have enjoyed the relationships that I've made. I'm excited to be back on the Rez and I'm looking forward to helping any way I can!

I am the newest Substance Use Disorder Counselor at Muckleshoot

Behavioral Health. I am currently facilitating the PM IOP groups, assessments, and individual counseling for Natives seeking help for their substance use. I am excited and honored to be here and willing to help in whatever capacity I can to assist the Muckleshoot community, (and other Native populations,) in achieving health, wellness, and balance, and develop tools for the recovery that each person seeking help deserves.

I have been employed as an "advocate for self-empowerment" for individuals struggling with substance use disorder for five years. I am passionate about the work I do because of my own life long struggles with trauma, abuse, poverty, homelessness, criminality, and addiction. I had no idea that I could overcome the pain or shame of my past until I started succeeding in my own recovery. I was 41 years old with 41 whole years of believing all the negative messages I received from family, friends, significant others, professionals, employers, and society, in general. I had no hope and only found relief in escaping through behavior and substance addiction. But I have never been more grateful to be WRONG!

I began my recovery journey in 2012 and spent three years failing. In September 2015 I finally put the shovel down and stopped digging. It is because of the unconditional positive regard, empathy, compassion, experience, guidance, and support I received in the recovery community and from addiction professionals that I was able to achieve success and it's what motivates me to provide those same attributes to the people I serve.

I genuinely believe in the inherent value and ability in each person and my hope is that I am able to provide a safe space and relevant, customized approaches to assist the Muckleshoot community in achieving long-term recovery!

Carlton Buren

IOP Counselor

Hello, my name is Carlton Buren. I was born and raised in Seattle, WA. I am 55 years old and have worked for Muckleshoot Behavioral Health since December 2017.

I am the afternoon Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) counselor at Behavioral Health, where we use the "Fallen Warriors" workbook, a culturally based curriculum created by John Zacher.

I also am the Vivitrol and Sublocade incentive coordinator. I give

incentive cards to clients who are in compliance with treatment and are on the Vivitrol or Sublocade shot. The meaning behind this is to help motivate clients to continue to get the medicine they need for a successful recovery.

Sublocade is a prescription subdermal injection administered once a month. The injection releases buprenorphine, a partial opioid agonist, into the body steadily over 28 days.

Vivitrol (naltrexone) is another prescription injection administered once a month. It's an opioid antagonist that prevents the person from getting "high" on opioids and also helps decrease the cravings for alcohol. It acts as a treatment for Opioid Use Disorder because it blocks the effects of opioids and alcohol, discouraging people from taking opioids or drinking alcohol.

I also do assessments and individual sessions as often as needed. Additionally, I do outreaches at SCORE jail to see Muckleshoot Tribal members and help with their needs and let them know that BHP is here to help them in any way possible as they maneuver through the legal system.

This is also the first year that Muckleshoot has started the Healing to Wellness Court at Tribal Court. I will be working with the tribal court in this program to help Tribal Members get misdemeanors off of their record by completing the Healing to Wellness Court Program.

I am honored and privileged to watch Muckleshoot grow! In my time here, I have watched Muckleshoot build a Clean and Sober community next to the Adult Recovery House and the New Community Center that will be open this Spring!







Sound Vibrational Healing for Families & Youth

"If you want to know the secrets of the Universe, think in terms of Energy, Frequency, and Vibration." –Nikola Tesla

Many families and youth in this modern day society are overwhelmingly bombarded by fast-paced and high stress environments. This has contributed to a disconnection from the natural cycles of Mother Earth. Furthermore, many harmful impacts are seen on the human body's nervous/immune system and within the structure of families/communities. Dr. Robert M. Sapolsky, Neurological Sciences Professor at Stanford University, states, "Stress-related disease emerges, predominantly, out of the fact that we so often activate a physiological system that has evolved for responding to acute physical emergencies, but we turn it on for months on end, worrying about mortgages, relationships, and promotions." Our bodies are about 60% water, which makes them very strong conductors of sound, therefore--Sound Vibrational Healing is an effective tool for helping restore the natural balance of Mind, Body, and Spirit.

As a Mexican Indigenous female, I have personally experienced many of the harmful impacts as I adapted to how I was taught to do so in the mainstream education and society. This has led me to explore holistic Medicine and traditional Indigenous healing practices. During this pursuit, I crossed paths with Sound Vibrational Healing and this has been one of the most positively impactful tools in my own healing journey. The Muckleshoot Tribe recently supported my further education at Atma Buti—International Sound and Vibrational School (AtmaButi.org) in Colorado. I am excited to offer sound baths and individual sessions incorporating Sound Vibrational Healing techniques for Youth and Families.

TRIBAL DISABILITY PROGRAM

<u>Starting April 4th</u> any <u>enrolled Muckleshoot tribal member who is</u> currently receiving SSDI or SSI as a disabled or blind person can apply for the Tribal Disability Benefit. Members need to provide the following information:

- Verification of tribal membership
- Current verification letter(dated within the last 30 days) from Social Security

Starting April 11th any enrolled Muckleshoot tribal member who has applied for SSDI or SSI but was denied and is within their timeframe for appeal can have their case reviewed by the Tribal Disability Program attorney. Members who have applied for benefits but have not received a determination can also have their applications reviewed. Members need to provide the following information:

- Verification of tribal membership
- Any correspondence to or from Social Security, including your application for SSDI or SSI

<u>Starting April 18th</u> any <u>enrolled Muckleshoot tribal member who would</u> like assistance applying for SSDI or SSI can receive assistance. Members need to provide the following information:

- Verification of tribal membership
- Information on medical conditions, providers seen, medications, employment history, education history, and information on military service. Additional information may be necessary to complete your application.




Teaching Culture to Youth

In a collaboration project between the Warriors Path Program, the Culture Department, and Behavioral Health, youth in the community are being taught traditional ways of processing fish, including drying, smoking, and canning methods. This process, called šəbus has been utilized for many generations.

Teaching youth the traditional practices helps them develop pride in their culture, learn new skills, find passion and joy in life, and is a strong deterrent from high-risk behaviors, such as the use of drugs and alcohol.



Fifteen youth community members have participated in this project and engaged in the opportunity to learn traditional practices that are highly valuable skills today, as well as for future generations.

MEDICAID IS ENDING CONTINUOUS COVERAGE ENROLLMENT BY THE END OF MARCH 2023.

- · At the end of December 2022, Congress passed legislation that included the decoupling of the Public Health Emergency with Medicaid's continuous enrollment, ending the practice by the end of March 2023.
- With this legislation we can say with certainty that the continuous coverage of Medicaid that has been in force since 2020 will end in the spring of 2023.
- In March and again in April, customers with upcoming renewal dates will have their Domestic production activities deduction removed.
- The Washington Health Care Authority will return to the normal process of redetermining if current Washington Apple Health (Medicaid) enrollees are still eligible yearly on their renewal date by sending information to the federal hub for verification of application content, which includes identity, citizenship, tax filing status, income verification, etc.





Pour Some Sugar on Me: Managing Blood Sugar for Diabetes

Glucose comes from the Greek word for "sweet" - It's a type of sugar created from digesting food and the human body uses it for energy. As it travels through the bloodstream to cells, it's called blood glucose or blood sugar. Glucose is made mainly from foods rich in carbohydrates "carbs" like bread, potatoes, and rice.

Type 2 Diabetes, the cells don't respond to insulin like they should. So the pancreas needs to make more insulin to move glucose into the cells. Eventually, the pancreas is damaged and can't make enough insulin to meet the body's needs.

Many foods break down into blood glucose is used for energy to fuel our brain, heart, and muscles. Blood glucose usually comes from the food we eat or is made by the liver. It's usually found in two places; in the blood stream as it is carried to all of our organs and cells, and inside the cell where it is changed into energy. Most of the cells in our body use glucose for energy. Insulin is like a key and without the insulin "keys" there is no way to unlock the cells of our body to let in the blood glucose. Because blood glucose cannot move from our blood into our cells, the blood



glucose stays in our blood, therefore causes blood sugar levels to rise. Managing blood sugar is a key to controlling Diabetes.

Signs and Symptoms of Type 2 Diabetes

The symptoms of type 2 diabetes can be so mild that you don't notice them. About 8 million people who have it don't know it. Symptoms include:

Being very thirsty Peeing a lot Blurry vision Being cranky Tingling or numbness in your hands or feet Fatigue/feeling worn out Wounds that don't heal Yeast infections that keep coming back Feeling hungry Weight loss without trying Getting more infections

Helpful tips to manage glucose levels:

- Manage our weight. Exercise regularly: Exercise can help reduce the glucose in our blood. Aim for 30-45 minutes of physical activity 3-5 days of the week. Activities such as brisk walking outside, on a treadmill or at a mall, dancing, swimming, low impact aerobics, stair climbing, and riding a stationary bike.
- Quit smoking: ask your medical provider for assistance with smoking cessation intervention as needed
- Eat a balanced healthy diet, avoiding processed foods and sugary beverages. We encourage those whom are followed at the Health and Wellness Center to schedule an appointment with both the Registered Dietician and Diabetes Nurse.
- Glucose monitoring: Monitoring blood sugar rou-

tinely and consistently according to our medical provider's recommendation. Bring our glucometer to our diabetes follow up appointments!

Taking our medications regularly and consistently: Medications may be ordered to help manage glucose levels. If medications are not taken routinely, our medical provider would be unable to know whether our current dosage of medication is therapeutic.

With a bit of knowledge and dedication, Type 2 diabetes can be controlled. Managing diabetes means getting as close to a normal (nondiabetic) blood glucose level as we safely can. Generally, this means levels between 70 and 130 mg/dl before meals, and less than 180 two hours after starting a meal. We do not need to figure these things out on our own. The Muckleshoot Medical Clinic and Community Health Program diabetes care team includes a doctor, dietitian, diabetes nurse, and other health care professionals. We offer a support team to help manage Diabetes!

Muckleshoot Human Resources Announces Estate Planning Benefit for Government Employees

All Muckleshoot Tribal Members, Community Members, and Muckleshoot Government Employees are Eligible for Free Estate Planning Services

Basic Estate Planning Includes:

Will - a written document that distributes homes on tribal lands, trust land interests, fee property interests, and personal property that is validly executed and complies with applicable Federal, State, and Tribal laws

Power of Attorney - a written document that authorizes someone else to handle certain matters, such as finances or health care, on your behalf and it remains in effect if incapacitated, such as due to illness or an accident

Healthcare Directive - a written document in which a person specifies what actions should be taken for their health if they are no longer able to make decisions for themselves because of illness or incapacity

Disposition of Remains - a written document that expresses the decedent's wishes regarding the place or method of disposition of his or her remains, or designates an agent to direct the type, place, and method of disposition




